INTRODUCTION

This booklet will help you to consider the content of the subjects which are available to you. You should consider all the advice given to you in the 'Key information' booklet and speak to all your teachers for advice before making your choices.

Please remember we will do our very best to give your first preferences, however please be aware that we can only confirm all choices when all pupils have selected their preferences and the timetable has been produced.

GCSE art, craft and design involves learning across a variety of experiences and through various processes, tools, techniques, materials and resources to generate different kinds of evidence of working and outcomes. Emphasis is on an increased breadth of approach commensurate in demand with the other titles.

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Students must explore and create work associated with areas of study from at least two titles listed below:

FINE ART: for example drawing, painting, sculpture, installation, lens-/light-based media, photography and the moving image, printmaking, mixed media and land art.

TEXTILE DESIGN: for example art textiles, fashion design and illustration, costume design, constructed textiles, printed and dyed textiles, surface pattern, stitched and/or embellished textiles, soft furnishings and/or textiles for interiors, digital textiles and installed textiles.

PHOTOGRAPHY: for example portraiture, location photography, studio photography, experimental imagery, installation, documentary photography, photo-journalism, moving image: film, video and animation, fashion photography.

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COMPONENT 1: must show evidence of working in areas of study drawn from two or more of the titles taking into account the distinguishing characteristics of art, craft and design.

COMPONENT 2: must show evidence of areas of study drawn from one or more of the titles.

The areas of study selected for Component 1 can be the same as, or different from, those selected for Component 2.

Students must explore, through a range of two-dimensional and/or three-dimensional processes and media, practical application of skills and relevant critical and contextual sources such as the work of contemporary artists, craftspeople and designers and the different purposes, intentions and functions of art, craft and design as appropriate to their own work.

This course has real relevance for the skills and knowledge of the modern world. The course looks at what goes on behind the scenes and pupils will use computer programming, develop critical thinking, analysis and problem solving skills.

A GCSE COURSE

Drama is an exciting, creative and challenging course which allows pupils to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of performance skills. Drama students will be expected to create, perform and evaluate their own performance skills. Time will also be spent developing an awareness of the social, historical and cultural context of dramatic productions through the study of theatre makers and play scripts.

HOW WILL THE WORK BE ASSESSED?

GCSE Drama is divided into three components for study:

Fine art is the need to explore an idea, convey an experience or respond to a theme or issue of personal significance.

AREAS OF STUDY

In Component 1 and Component 2 students are required to work in one or more area(s) of fine art, such as those listed below:

- drawing
- painting
- sculpture
- photography
- printmaking
- mixed media

They may explore overlapping areas and combinations of areas.

Through these areas of study pupils will improve their knowledge of:

- how sources relate to individual, social, historical, environmental, cultural, ethical and/or issues-based contexts
- how ideas, themes, forms, feelings and concerns can inspire personally determined responses that are primarily aesthetic, intellectual or conceptual.

The ways in which meanings, ideas and intentions relevant to fine art can be communicated including the use of:

- figurative representation, abstraction, stylisation, simplification, expression, exaggeration and imaginative interpretation
- visual and tactile elements, such as:
 - colour
 - line
 - form
 - tone
 - texture
 - shape
 - composition
 - rhythm
 - scale
 - structure
 - surface

The GCSE French follows the AQA syllabus and consists of the four key elements of a language:

- speaking
- listening
- reading
- writing

The themes covered within the GCSE include:

- family and friends
- technology in everyday life
- leisure activities
- customs and festivals
- travel
- life at school and college
- career choices and ambitions

Pupils will build on their knowledge and understanding gained in Year 7-9 but the complexity of the language will increase, ensuring that pupils are able to use grammar effectively and translate with confidence. Speaking and listening becomes more important at GCSE, and there will be regular opportunities to respond to written and spoken French.

Examinations are taken at the end of Year 11 in the four key skills. All carry an equal weighting of 25% and are available in both higher and foundation tiers. Foundation tier will test grades 5-1, higher will test grades 9-4. Students will be entered for one tier across all four papers.

FUTURE CAREERS

A qualification in French can lead to many opportunities. Many university courses now include language modules within their Arts and Science degrees. Languages help to develop confidence, communication and problem solving skills. Languages also combine well with other GCSE subjects and further education courses.

Languages are nationally a very highly regarded subject and a GCSE in this subject shows an ability to work hard and sustain concentration, whilst showing potential employers that you have many transferable skills and strong communication skills. A GCSE in a foreign language forms part of the Ebacc, a measure which sets the more academically able apart.

The course has three elements; listening; performing and composing. Each element is explored throughout the course. The four areas of study include: Western classical tradition 1650-1910, Popular music, Traditional music and Western Classical tradition since 1910.

All pupils taking this course should already be skilled and be grade 3+ standard in playing an instrument or using their voice and having lessons on that instrument and therefore will be encouraged to have **further lessons** in their chosen instrument. These can be provided through the school, or taken privately on a regular basis.

..... Technical Award - HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE

This award prepares pupils who may wish to have a career in the health and social care industry, or in an early years setting (e.g. a nursery).

However, due to the nature of the course, and the level of study, the course is applicable to anybody with an interest in how, as human beings, we are influenced by everything around us. This course is a pathway to a large variety of career options and can also lead directly on to a higher level college course or apprenticeship in the industry.

The course consists of 3 components:

DETAILS OF ASSESSMENT

This course is a combination of controlled assessment tasks and one external examination task.

There are 2 levels of entry. Grades - Pass, merit, distinction, distinction*

REMINDER

It is **essential** that candidates who opt for this course organise at least one week of their Year 10 work experience in an appropriate health, social care or early years setting, as determined by the examination board controlled assessment criteria for component 2.

Technical Award - IT

EXAM BOARD – AQA (for more information visit www.aqa.org.uk)

This qualification will study the fundamental aspects required in the three important IT occupational areas: Creative, Data Management and Technical. Each area will cover the theory behind the topic in depth with a mixture of real life case studies, practical tasks and a study of theoretical concepts, enabling students to develop their IT knowledge, understanding and skills. Learning will take place in a vocational context, allowing students to create products or artefacts that demonstrate their ability to put theory into practice.

The occupational areas have been chosen from industry research showing current shortages of skilled people within the creative, data management and technical areas.

This course allows pupils to have the opportunity to develop skills in making high quality products using woods, metals and polymers.

They will be expected to make a range of products, prototypes and samples, applying their skills and technical knowledge to ensure that the product is fit for purpose.

Pupils will have the opportunity to use traditional craft skills and modern technologies.

Upon leaving school, pupils can progress from this course onto A- Level Product Design, or BTEC courses in Engineering, or Construction and the Built Environment.

Technical Award - SPORT

BTEC Level 2 First Award in Sport is a high-quality work-related qualification, offering unique progression and career opportunities for students who wish to work in the sport and leisure sector. Highly transferable and recognised by employers, colleges and universities, Technical Award qualifications are suitable for anyone who wants to take sport seriously. The qualification prepares young people for careers in the sports sector.

ASSESSMENT

- The Level 2 First Award in Sport Course consists of 75% Internal Assessment (through assignment based evidence) and 25% External Assessment (through an online exam set by the board).
- The assignments allow the student to demonstrate they have skills and knowledge to achieve a Level 1, Level 2 Pass, Level 2 Merit, Level 2 Distinction and Level 2 Distinction* Grade.
- At the end of the course, the student's assignment grades are placed together to determine the overall grade for their qualification.
- Students will complete 4 units of work to achieve their qualification.

SUMMARY

The qualification is equivalent to 1 GCSE and offers a direct progression on to BTEC Level 3 Certificate in Sport. The qualification also offers learners an opportunity in the leisure sector for employment.

..... Technical Award - VISUAL COMMUNICATION

EXAM BOARD – AQA (for more information visit www.aqa.org.uk)

This course focuses on developing drawing, design and layout skills. Pupils have the opportunity to use traditional skills such as drawing and sketching in 2D and 3D and also modern technologies such as CAD, Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator and web design.

The course is designed for pupils who want to study graphics in a practical and imaginative way, developing graphic design skills needed to create materials for marketing and promotion.

Upon leaving school, pupils can progress from this course onto A- Level Product Design or Graphics or BTEC courses in Graphics.
